Oliver Schenker is Acting Head of the ZEW research department "Environmental and Resource Economics, Environmental Management". He co-coordinated the FP7 project ENTRACTE on the interaction of climate policy instruments. Schenker's main research interests include climate change, international trade, and economic growth.



Jos Delbeke is Director-General of the European Commission's DG Climate Action. A trained economist, he is one of Europe's key players in international climate policy. For several years, Delbeke was responsible for developing Europe's International Climate Change strategy. He also acted as the Commission's chief negotiator at the UNFCCC Conferences of the Parties.



Rudolf Schüßler has studied Economics, Sociology, and Philosophy in Giessen and Munich. He is currently Professor of Philosophy for the 'Philosophy & Economics' degree course offered at the University of Bayreuth, Germany. His specialities include climate ethics, theories of justice, and the ethics of negotiation.
