EU Competitiveness and the 2030 Climate and Energy Framework An Industry Perspective

Brussels, November 23, 2016

The 2030 climate and energy framework represents a further step made by the European Union towards meeting its long-term goals to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The ambitious climate and energy targets entail a challenging economic transition, which calls for continuous efforts to improve our understanding of the expected impacts on the economy as a whole, as well as on each economic sector. Industry deserves particular attention within this context. Whilst it plays an important role in achieving decarbonisation targets, the industrial sector is also particularly vulnerable to international competition and thus requires that a truly level playing field is established on a global level. In order to address specific concerns regarding the competitiveness of European industries, the European Commission has launched a study aimed at assessing the implications of the 2030 climate and energy framework in view of recent developments in international climate change negotiations. The study, conducted by ZEW, is based on the general equilibrium PACE model, which allows long-term impact analysis of selected policy scenarios on a detailed sectorial level, in particular for manufacturing sectors. The final results from the study will be presented at this conference and stakeholders and policy makers will be given an opportunity to debate, on a technical level, the various approaches taken to modelling the economic impacts of climate and energy policies.
